



### The Alternative:

# Give local education leaders more autonomy

States and districts throughout the country are adopting weighted-student funding models that allocate dollars based on student needs and push autonomy down to local leaders.

In 2013, California eliminated over 50 categorical allotments, and research has given this reform high marks.<sup>3</sup>



A FUNDING FORMULA BASED ON LOCAL CONTROL AND STUDENT NEEDS

This allows local leaders to better align goals, strategies and resource allocation decisions.
